Course Requirements

Objective: This course is designed to understand and critically think about the many aspects of the world they live. Students will engage in speaking, writing, think critically, and function as responsible global citizens throughout the course of the semester.

Attendance: Required for lecture. The class only meets once a week for four hours, missing a class will create a major problem since most of the writing will be based solely on what is discussed during the class time. Therefore, if you miss, you will receive zero points for your participation and reaction paper.

Athletes: All make-up work must be completed within one week of the assignment or receive a zero.

Course Components

Writings: Each student will write a reaction essay for each topic discussed throughout the semester. The essays are due the following class. Each essay submitted must be single-spaced and no less than 600 words. Please put the title of the reaction essay on the top line with your name directly below it and centered. Do not put anything else. These writings are expected to be similar to graduate papers/essays and scored out of ten points.

Examinations: There are essay examinations for this course. Both examinations will be based on readings for the course and you will be able to use your textbook as reference. Each examination will have three questions that will require critical analysis of the issues discussed.

Term Paper: You will be assigned a term paper on an environmental topic of your choice. The instructor must approve your topic. The term paper must be a minimum of 15 pages (double spaced) with a minimum of 10 resources. Sixty percent of the sources must be in the print form (i.e. books, journal articles, e-journals, etc). The remaining forty percent may be from websites. The term paper is due on April 19, 2010.

Speech: You will present your term paper topic the week before it is due, April 12, 2010. Your speech must be between 5 and 8 minutes in length and highlight your research. You may use PowerPoint or give a traditional speech.

Course Etiquette

Success in this course will be based solely on your ability alone. You are not entitled to be given an 'A' just because you are enrolled in the course. You must work for the grade you desire. Ask questions when you do not understand a concept. Contact the instructor for further help. Take notes during lecture and read course materials. Respect your classmates and instructor. Disrespect results in a 100-point reduction of your total point score.

Due dates are strictly enforced. All work for the semester is to be completed by due dates within the semester. No additional work or extra credit will be given after the semester ends to change your grade. The final grade for the course is final.
