Course goals: French 2201/2202 are structured to give you ample opportunity to practice the four language skills of reading, writing, listening and speaking. You will review grammar and vocabulary learned in 1101/1102 and continue to enhance your knowledge of the cultures of the francophhone world.

Course Materials:

- 1) Sur le vif Textbook and text CD (at textbook rental)
- 2) <u>Cahier d'exercices écrits et de laboratoire</u> for <u>Sur le vif</u> (If you do not already have a copy from FLF 2201, you may use copies in the lab and write out your answers on other paper.
- 3) Collage: Léctures littéraires (at textbook rental)

Attendance: Because the opportunity to speak and hear French is a vital part of learning the language, attendance is mandatory. Unexcused absences and habitual tardiness will adversely affect your grade. For excused absences, you must contact as soon as possible, no later than the day of the absence. If you do not contact me the day of the absence, upon your return to class you must be able to document BOTH an excusable absence AND a valid reason for being unable to contact me (or leave a message on voice mail). You are allowed 3 unexcused absences without change to your grade. Any additional unexcused absences may, at the discretion of the instructor, result in a reduced final grade.

Only I can excuse absences. Excused absences include illness, official University activities or emergencies. Missing class in order to catch an early ride home for vacation or the weekend, sleeping in because your alarm clock didn't go off, an appointment which could be scheduled at other times, etc., are NOT excusable. If you are absent, be prepared for the class when you return: get in touch with another student to check on the assignments due the day of your return. Late homework will not be accepted for a grade in the case of an unexcused absence. For excused absences, consult with me for making up assignments or handing in assignments early.

Oral work: 30% of your final grade is for class participation, based on evidence of preparation for class, active participation, improvement and attitude. Aside from some introductory material in English the first few days, the class will be conducted in French with as little recourse as possible to English. To understand what is going on in class, it is essential that you prepare assignments before coming to class. It is also important to learn vocabulary as quickly as possible (see my web site for tips on learning vocabulary). Use the language lab on Thursdays, when we don't have class, as well as on one or two other days during the week. In class, pay attention to my gestures and other visual cues to help your understanding. If you do not understand something in class, ask. If you still aren't sure about it after my in-class explanation, see me after class. I am happy to give you an extended explanation-in English!-outside of class.

Workbook and Lab Manual: Prepare written exercises in the Workbook and listen to the *CDs* in the lab in order to complete the lab manual by the date indicated. Break up your lab work into 2-4, 20- to 30-minute sessions per chapter. Suggested pacing for workbook is indicated for chapter 5. Use this to plan subsequent chapters. The lab activites can sometimes be challenging, but don't give up too easily! Your persistence will pay off through improved listening comprehension and pronunciation. You may need to listen to each section at least 3 times to get the information needed to complete the activities. The workbook/lab book provides correction keys with answers to most of the exercises. Please check your answers and correct those that you can before handing in the workbook/lab book. Hand in the workbook and lab manual pages on the due date, stapled together (workbook and lab separately). Do not attempt any other origami-like technique to hold the pages together.

Compositions: You will be writing several compositions throughout the semester, based on specific vocabulary and grammar studied up to that point. When you hand in the compositions, I will correct them using symbols to indicate errors. You will then <u>correct the composition</u> (rewriting the text and submitting both the original copy and the correction), to <u>earn back up to 1/2 of the points lost on the first copy</u>. For example, if you receive 80% on the first copy, you can earn 1/2 of 20%--or up to 10%--making your final grade on the composition 90%. I strongly encourage you to make corrections if you receive less than 90% on the first copy. <u>Grades on compositions that are not corrected will be reduced by 5%.</u>

Oral Interviews. The final oral interview will be based on materials covered during the semester. Specific information will be discussed later in the semester.
