QUIZZES

There will be a multiple-choice quiz given at the beginning of class each Thursday. It will cover material assigned and lectures given since the previous week's quiz, and will have no fewer than ten but no more than twenty questions.

EXAMINATIONS

The Mid-Term examination will have one or two essay questions and no fewer than four short-answer (one paragraph) identification questions.

The Final Examination will be somewhat longer than the Mid-Term examination. It will have at least one question based on assignments, discussions, and lectures of the entire semester, and at least one question based on the work assigned since the second hour examination. It will also include identification questions.

For all examinations (but not quizzes), please bring at least one examination booklet to the History Department office by the day before the examination is to be given. Write your name, my name, and the class number (HIS 1500) on the front cover of the booklet and give it to the secretary. Examination booklets are available for purchase (at a cost of less than \$0.25) from the University bookstore.
